Franklin schools increase SAT scores

FRANKLIN COUNTY — The Franklin County Schools recently published the 2011-12 SAT scores. While the state and national scores slightly decreased from last year, Franklin County scores increased. At the three high schools, 251 students took the test.

"We continue to work hard to increase SAT averages at the district level to the state average," said Superintendent Dr. Eddie Ingram.

The SAT exam

The SAT is a national exam offered through the College Board. The exam is designed to measure a student's chance of success at the college level.

This is the seventh year of the three-section SAT with math, critical reading and writing. The writing section includes an essay and multiple-choice questions on writing.

The College Board has maintained a scoring system of a total of 800 points per section. On the two sections of the old test, a perfect score would have been 1600. Students can now score up to 800 on each of three sections, for a perfect score of 2400.
